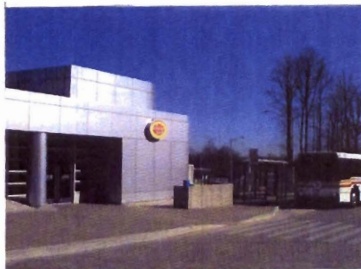


# FAIRFAX CONNECTOR TRANSIT CENTERS FACT SHEET

## TYSONS-WEST\*PARK TRANSIT STATION



Service to the Tysons's-West\*Park Transit Station commenced in late January 1999, when it opened. However, full service was not implemented until initiation of the Dulles Corridor Express Bus service in July 1999.

The Tysons's-West\*Park Transit Station serves as a hub for bus service in the Tysons's Corner area. Passengers may board or transfer to buses serving Tysons's Corner, West Falls Church Metro Station, Reston, or Herndon. The Transit Station features a staffed Connector Store which provides bus schedules, system maps, ticket and pass sales, and other transportation information. An indoor lobby and waiting area with vending machines and restrooms are provided for customer convenience, and a Kiss-and Ride lot with 30 minute parking is available for passenger drop-off or pick-up. Fairfax County's electronic kiosk CRIS, bicycle racks, public pay telephones, and newspaper racks are also available.

Today, this facility serves as point of connectivity for 9 bus routes (four FAIRFAX CONNECTOR and 6 Metrobus). Within the facility is a Connector Store providing information and selling fare media. The Connector Store is open Monday through Friday from 10:00am to 6:00pm.

On an average weekday, Connector operates 247 bus trips to, from, and through the Transit Station. The routes serving the facility consist of a combination of local, feeder, express, and shuttle routes. Almost all of the Metrobus bus routes serving the Transit Station are the starting point and/or terminal point of the route, while only one FAIRFAX CONNECTOR route starts and ends at the Transit Station. Accordingly, bus trips which start or end at this location will tend to have limited ridership as they arrive at the end of their route or depart at the start of the route.

Approximately 1,774 FAIRFAX CONNECTOR passengers board, alight, transfer, or pass through the Transit Station on an average weekday.



The Connector Store has reported average monthly sales of \$17,885 in total fare media sales for the first 9 months of this budget year. Sales have increased in each subsequent year since they began in September 1999. Information inquiries for the first 9 months of this budget year were approximately 18,846 contacts.

## HERNDON-MONROE PARK & RIDE TRANSIT STATION



Service to the Herndon-Monroe Park & Ride Transit Station commenced in late January 1999, when it opened. However, full service was not implemented until initiation of the Dulles Corridor Express Bus service in July 1999.

The Herndon-Monroe Park & Ride facility serves as a hub and transfer point for express and local bus service, carpools and vanpools. Express and local bus service operates to and from Herndon, Reston, Tysons Corner, and West Falls Church Metro Station. The facility offers 1,745 FREE parking spaces, a Kiss-and-Ride area, and features direct access onto the Dulles Toll Road. Bicycle racks, Public pay telephones, and newspaper racks are also available. Bus schedules are posted at the bus bays. The Connector Store at Herndon-Monroe is open Tuesday and Thursdays from 6:30am to 10:30am and 3:00pm to 7:00pm to provide bus schedules, system maps, ticket and pass sales and other information.

Today, this facility serves as point of connectivity for 9 FAIRFAX CONNECTOR bus routes and one Metrobus route (5A). Within the facility is a Connector Store providing information and selling fare media.

On an average weekday, Connector operates 336 bus trips to, from, and through the Transit Station. The routes serving the facility consist of a combination of local, feeder, express, and shuttle routes. Almost all of the bus routes serving the Transit Station are the starting point and/or terminal point of the route.

Approximately 5,876 FAIRFAX CONNECTOR passenger's board, alight, transfer, or pass through the Transit Station on an average weekday.



The Connector Store has reported average monthly sales of \$2,629 in total fare media sales for the first 9 months. Sales have increased in each subsequent year since operations began. Information inquiries for the first 9 months of this budget year were approximately 6,292 contacts.

### RESTON TOWN CENTER TRANSIT STATION



Service to the Reston Town Center Transit Station commenced in 2006, when it opened.

Today, this facility serves as point of connectivity for 8 Fairfax Connector bus routes. Within the facility is a Connector Store providing information and selling fare media. The connector Store is open

Monday through Friday from 6:30am to 7:00pm to provide bus schedules, system maps, ticket and pass sales and other information.

On an average weekday Fairfax Connector operates 551 bus trips to, from, and through the Transit Station. The routes serving the facility consist of a combination of local, feeder, express, and shuttle routes. Accordingly, bus trips which start or end at this location tend to have variable ridership as they arrive at the end of their route or depart at the start of the route.

Approximately 1,093 FAIRFAX CONNECTOR passenger's board, alight, transfer, or pass through the Transit Station on an average weekday.



The Connector Store has reported average monthly sales of \$13,356 in total fare media sales for the first 9 months. Sales have increased in each subsequent year since they began operations. Information inquiries for the first 9 months of this budget year were approximately 22,028 contacts.
