From the Rabbi:

I hope everyone has had a wonderful summer. This past year, our Friday night dinners had an international theme. Each dinner focused on the traditional Jewish cuisine of a single country, with volunteer chefs (including the Rabbi) doing the cooking and baking. Those dinners were very successful and we will continue that theme this coming year. Please join us to plan, to cook — or just come and eat.

Our Youth

This coming school year will mark a major change in our Religious School. Beth Israel Synagogue in Wallingford will be sending their children to learn with ours in our building. Please make them feel at home. While those children will be attending Jr. Congregation and Family Shabbat services at Beth Israel, they will be participating in all other activities of our school. We expect that they will attend at least one of our Shabbat dinners and they intend to invite us to attend a Shabbat dinner at Beth Israel. This combination will more than double the size of our school. In addition, we will be engaging in one or more joint programs with Adath Israel in Middletown, as we had done the past two years. As in the past two years, we shall be placing emphasis on Hebrew literacy. Finally, we will be teaching units on the Holocaust and the Shabbat service.

Adult Education

Our Adult Education program, while not yet finalized, will be a little different this year. We are going to experiment with holding some sessions at a congregant's home on a Sunday evening to allow those who cannot make it to the synagogue on Sunday morning to participate. One of the programs on which we are working is a scholar-in-residence program on Women in the Bible. I hope that many of you will be able to attend. We also are going to have a session on the synagogue service: how is it structured; when did the various prayers become a part of the service; what do the prayers mean and how can we make the service meaningful for all — even those with limited knowledge of Hebrew.

High Holidays

The High Holidays fall at the end of the month this year. Our *S'lihot* observance on Saturday evening, September 26, will begin with a movie and discussion. Following a refreshment break, we will have our service. The next day we will hold our annual Cemetery Service. The *Tashlikh* ceremony will be held on Sunday, October 2, noontime, at Hubbard Park, as we symbolically cast our sins into the waters.

This is a time of introspection and self-reflection. As we do so, we are mindful that this past year has been a challenging one, both for individuals and for Temple B'nai Abraham. Let us resolve to help those less fortunate than we and may the year 5772 be one of health and peace for us, for our community and for the world.

From the President's Corner:

Twenty-two years ago my husband Michael and I went in search of a synagogue that would meet the needs of our family. We were like "Goldie Locks and the Three Bears" looking for the perfect fit. We had two children, Joshua age 6 and Alyse age 3. We knew that we wanted a synagogue where we were comfortable and welcomed, a place where our children could get a good Jewish education, and where we'd find young couples like ourselves who we could socialize with and develop friendships. Over a period of several months we tried out several synagogues, but just as Goldie Locks encountered, not all chairs were comfortable and although some of the bowls of porridge may have looked good once you've tasted them, you realize they're too hot or cold. Then we attended an open house at Temple B'nai Abraham where members warmly greeted us, the chairs felt just right and the porridge was just the right temperature.

Michael and I knew immediately that we had found the right fit, and we began the process of signing the children up for religious school and carving out a place for ourselves. I became involved in the auxiliary, ran the Gift Shop, and sat on the Board of Directors. I also volunteered in the kitchen on many occasions preparing for celebrations of social and cyclical events. Michael got involved slowly, but by the time Joshua was preparing for his Bar Mitzvah he too was a regular.

Over the years we've made our financial donations and supported the synagogue by volunteering our time, but as I look back I realize how little that was in comparison to what my family has gained. My children received a well-rounded education and through their Bar and Bat Mitzvahs brought pride to our families in their accomplishments. The congregation supported us when Michael's father and then my father passed away, and have since provided a minyan for us to say *kaddish* without hesitation. We have certainly developed lasting friendships. We have found a home, an extended family and a

sense of community as have many of you. I feel blessed to be part of this congregation.

We will also need several helpers on **Sunday, October 23rd** to take down and put away the Sukkah. Please call the Temple office and let Linda know you are willing to help.



Important Holiday Information:

As you are aware, the High Holidays will begin September 28th this year. Therefore High Holiday tickets will be in the mail early September. We will once again be offering Baby Sitting, but we need to know how many children to prepare for. The baby-sitting will be held in the large kindergarten room and **will be by reservation only. If there are no reservations, a babysitter will not be hired.** This provision will be for children who are Kindergarten age and under. You must notify the Temple office in advance (**by Wednesday, September 21st**) that you will be using the baby-sitting services. Baby sitting will begin at 10:00 AM for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and **will not be available for Kol Nidre.**

Children in **grades K through 2** are encouraged to attend **Jr. Jr. Congregation**, which will be held downstairs across from the Kindergarten room. This will be held on Rosh Hashanah (both days) 10:30 AM and Yom Kippur 10:00 AM. The children should know where you are sitting so they will be able to come to you when their services end.

Children in **grades 3 through 6** are required to attend **Jr. Congregation**. This will be held in the library and will begin at 10:30 AM both days of Rosh Hashanah and 10:00 AM on Yom Kippur. The children should know where you are sitting so they will be able to come to you when their services end.

We will once again have the “Shmooze Room” available. This room is now called the June Bogatz Children’s Library. Please feel free to go in there if you and your friend need to catch up on all that has happened since the holidays last year.

Parents – please remember to bring flashlights for the **children’s procession** after Neilah service, Saturday, Oct. 8th, 5:30 PM.



TASHLICH IN THE PARK

Tashlich is a remarkable ceremony which this year will be held on **Sunday, Oct. 2nd**, at **noon** in Hubbard Park near the duck pond. Children and their parents are expected to go to the park when school is dismissed. Hubbard Park is located on West Main Street.

Through the ritual of Tashlich we express not only our desire to be free from future sin, but our continuing hope that we will be forgiven for past misdeeds. It is customary to go to a flowing body of water and recite prayers while “casting” our sins (represented by pieces of bread) into the water.

So please join us for this meaningful ceremony at the **Hubbard Park Duck Pond on Oct. 2nd**. **THIS IS OPEN TO EVERYONE**

Don’t forget to bring bread (any type of bread or crackers). Leftover challah from your Rosh Hashanah dinners is perfect.

Additional Important High Holiday Notes:

1. Silent Meditation – Cantor Rabinowitz chants the beginning of the *Musaf Amidah* on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we will pause for a few moments of silent reflection and prayer before the *Unetaneh Tokef* prayer.
2. Gratitude for Recovery – Anyone who has undergone surgery, had a serious illness or an accident is invited to participate in the reciting of the *Gomel* blessing on 1st Day of Rosh Hashanah. Please contact the Temple office and we will send you a copy before hand.
3. Neilah Meditation – During the Neilah service on October 8th, we will once again offer individuals or families time to meditate and pray before the open ark.

High Holiday Guest Ticket Policy

- Members:** Receive one (1) ticket for a single membership and two (2) tickets for a family membership
- Adult Children:** No charge: up to age 26 and residing with the parents, or if members in good standing at another synagogue.
Otherwise, \$50 per person.
- Parents of Members:** No charge, if these relatives are members in good standing at another synagogue. Otherwise, \$50 per person.
- Military Personal:** No Charge
- College Students:** No Charge (full time students only)
- Non-Members:** \$100 per person for those **not residing** in Meriden or surrounding communities where members reside including Wallingford, Cheshire, Hamden, Southington, Berlin, Cromwell, Middletown, or Middlefield.
- \$150 **per person per day** for those **residing** in Meriden or the surrounding communities where members reside including Wallingford, Cheshire, Hamden, Southington, Berlin, Cromwell, Middletown, or Middlefield.
- Walk-In Policy:** Any person not possessing a ticket on any day of the High Holidays will be admitted and given a Walk-In Ticket/Donation Card for \$150 per person for that day only. The card will also give the individual the option of becoming a member and will have the current Temple Dues printed on it.

Special consideration will be made on a case-by-case basis by the Finance Committee for requests made in advance in writing.

You MUST bring your High Holiday ticket each day when you come as there will be someone checking the member and guest tickets.

Once again this year we will be collecting non-perishable food items for the Food Bank here in town. A box is set up in the hallway.

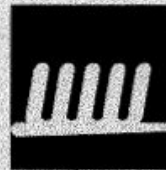
This food drive will run for the entire year. Food may be dropped off at any time – **except Shabbat and holidays.**
