### CALCULATING GRADES

1. When figuring out grade point average, you only take the core grade for each subject. The grades from sub-categories should NOT be included.

Example:

Reading:	B-
Comprehension:	B+
Reading Accuracy:	B-
Word Recognition:	C+

The over-all grade for reading in this example is an B-. That would be the only grade you use.

2. The same grading scale is used for all kids in the same school district. You will need to get an over-view of a majority of the report cards to see what scale to use. An example: Community A uses the 13 point scale. In looking at Jonny's report card you see that his grades are A, B, C, A, D, and F. You would NOT use the 5 point scale, you would still use the 13 point. In this case, Johnny just did not have any grades that required a (+) or (-) after them.

Communities that include athletes from another district, for example, Iola-Scandinavia has athletes also from Waupaca. In this case, two separate scales could be used. Once again, you will have to review the report card to see which fits each community best.

3. Complete report card is to be figured into the percentage grade.
4. If you are unsure as to what grading scale to use, you can contact your school district, they should be able to help you with this. If still un-sure, have your community representative bring a couple sample report cards to the conference meeting for the academic committee to review.
5. If your school uses only % for a grade, in place of letter grades, use the percentage specified.
6. When using the conversion chart, please don't try to match to exactly what you see. Your community may not have the same letter representation as found on the chart. Example: The 7 point chart, shows E+, E, E-, S+, S, S- and U. If your school uses S+, S, S-, N+, N, N- and U, you would still use the 7 point chart.
